Fraser River Tunnel Project Monthly Status Report | September 2024

1. Introduction

1.1 Project Overview

The Fraser River Tunnel Project is an eight-lane immersed tube tunnel that will replace the George Massey Tunnel on Highway 99. The new tunnel will include three general-purpose lanes and a dedicated transit lane in each direction. It will also provide a separated multi-use path to connect pedestrians and cyclists with active transportation routes on either side of the Fraser River. The Project includes a new eight-lane Deas Slough Bridge, related connections to the existing Highway 99 between Westminster Highway and Highway 17A, and decommissioning of the existing tunnel.

The Project will provide safe, reliable and accessible transportation options that meet the objectives for sustainable growth for the Metro Vancouver region. Key benefits of the Project include:

- Providing traffic congestion relief at the existing tunnel to the non-peak direction
- Addressing the long-term seismic safety performance of the existing tunnel
- Improving transit speed and reliability along the Highway 99 corridor
- Establishing a dedicated active transportation connection for pedestrians and cyclists across the Fraser River on Highway 99
- Maintaining the current clearances for the Fraser River navigational channel

The new tunnel is planned to be opened to traffic in 2030. Once the new tunnel is in operation, the existing George Massey Tunnel and ancillary infrastructure will be decommissioned by the end of 2032. Approval for the Project's Business Case was announced August 18, 2021.

1.2 Project Delivery

Transportation Investment Corporation, a provincial Crown corporation, is delivering and overseeing the Project on behalf of the Ministry of Transportation and Transit and the BC Transportation Financing Authority. The estimated cost of the Project is \$4.15 billion.

The Project is being delivered through a Progressive Design-Build (PDB) with Target Price model. The procurement process for the Project includes a Request for Qualifications (RFQ), a competitive Design Early Works Agreement Request for Proposals (DEWA RFP) and a development phase, which includes design and development and a concurrent Design-Build Agreement Request for Proposals (DBA RFP). Upon the Province's acceptance of a DBA proposal, the DBA will be executed, and the DBA and the construction phase will begin.

The Project entered procurement with a RFQ issued on June 14, 2023. Following a competitive-selection process, the Province selected Cross Fraser Partnership to enter into the DEWA on September 13, 2024, which marks the start of the development phase. The Cross Fraser Partnership team selected for the

development phase includes Bouygues Construction Canada Inc., Fomento de Construcciones y Contratas Canada Ltd., Pomerleau BC Inc. and Arcadis Canada Inc. During the development phase, the provincial team and the design-build team (i.e., the Design-Builder) will advance design of the new tunnel, prepare for construction in 2026 and deliver the Project's early works, which include design, site investigations, construction planning and initial permitting. Project completion is anticipated for 2030.

In advance of tunnel construction, corridor work is also underway, which includes the preloading of soil along Highway 99 in Richmond ("Highway 99 preload"). This work was awarded to Arsalan Construction Ltd. (Prime Contractor) on June 25, 2024 and is not undertaken by the Design-Builder.

Following the opening of the new eight-lane tunnel, the existing George Massey Tunnel and ancillary infrastructure will be decommissioned by the end of 2032.

1.3 Project Goals

Based on the mandate and results of consultation, four primary goals were identified for the Project:

- 1. Support sustainability of Fraser River Communities
- 2. Facilitate increased share of sustainable modes of transport
- 3. Enhance regional goods movement and commerce
- 4. Support a healthy environment

4. Monthly Highlights and Three-Month Lookahead

4.1 Safety

Scope:	• Continue to monitor safety for the Highway 99 preload work and confirm safety deliverables for the geotechnical investigations with the Design-Builder to ensure safety requirements are met.
Monthly Highlights:	 Completed second spot audit on Highway 99 preload work. Preliminary safety discussions commenced with the Design-Builder for upcoming geotechnical investigations.
Three- Month Lookahead:	 Begin development of the Project safety plan for the development phase. Continue to collaborate with the Design-Builder to ensure safety plans meet regulatory and work requirements and identify safety considerations for the construction phase. Continue to ensure Project team safety needs are met.

4.2 Quality

Scope:	• Implement an effective Quality Management System for work currently being delivered in advance of tunnel construction and future works to be delivered as part of tunnel construction.
Monthly Highlights:	 Reviewed quality documentation, including inspection and test plans, methodology statements and correlated check sheets. For the Highway 99 preload, continued monitoring the Prime Contractor's Quality Management System, including Quality Records, Nonconformity Reports/Log, and Opportunity for Improvement Log. Continued surveillance and quality audits of field construction and shop activities.
Three- Month Lookahead:	 Continue to monitor the quality of the Highway 99 preload. Develop Project Quality Management Plan for the upcoming geotechnical investigations.

4.3 Environmental

Scope:	 Complete environmental studies and investigations and obtain necessary regulatory approvals for the Project to proceed.
Monthly Highlights:	 The Project is in the Application Development and Review Phase of the provincial Environmental Assessment. The Project Team continued to prepare an Application for an Environmental Assessment Certificate to be submitted to the EAO. Supporting EAO-led engagement with technical advisors and 17 participating Indigenous nations.

	Obtained permits in support of the upcoming geotechnical investigations.
Three- Month Lookahead:	Continue to advance development of the Application for the Environmental Assessment.

4.4 Design and Construction

Scope:	 Develop a reference concept, technical requirements/specifications, and related technical studies for the Project and manage activities on-site.
Monthly Highlights:	 Finalized the format for receiving reports related to the tunnel-monitoring equipment placed in the George Massey Tunnel. Initiated technical meetings and workshops with the Design-Builder. Worked collaboratively with Design-Builder to prepare for in-river geotechnical investigations in November.
Three- Month Lookahead:	 Ongoing collaboration and coordination with BC Hydro. In-river geotechnical investigations to start in November 2024 with on-shore geotechnical investigations to follow.

4.5 First Nations

Scope:	 Engage with First Nations on Project matters of interest including economic opportunities and Project design, construction schedule and methodology.
Monthly Highlights:	Shared Environmental Assessment materials for review and comment.
Three- Month Lookahead:	 Engage with First Nations on Environmental Assessment, including collaborating to incorporate Indigenous Knowledge, and discussing order of events to application submission. Engage with First Nations during the developmental phase of the Project. Continue discussions with First Nations to complete capacity funding agreements.

4.6 Third Parties

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

Develop communications and engagement activities to support the Highway 99 preload and the upcoming geotechnical investigations through 2024 and early 2025. Conduct regular stakeholder meetings.
